## Agenda Item III.A.1.a.

## Alliant International University San Diego, California

## BACKGROUND

Alliant International University (Alliant) first registered with the Board of Regents in June 1999. The institution is headquartered in San Diego, California and provides educational programs ranging from the undergraduate certificate through the doctoral levels. The institution is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

## ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Alliant makes available 34 programs to Louisiana residents; eight certificate, two bachelors, twenty-one masters and three doctoral. A majority of the programs are education, business and/or health related. Since many of the education and health-related programs include an internship/clinical component, licensure is necessary.

## FACULTY AND STUDENTS

Alliant employs 73 faculty to support its online programs available to Louisiana residents. Of the 73 faculty, 29 are employed fulltime and 62 are trained at the doctoral level. The institution reported an enrollment of six students in masters programs in Louisiana.

## **FACILITIES**

Since the Alliant operates programs online with administrative and academic support in San Diego, there are no out-of-state physical facilities in Louisiana. Students will complete clinical/internship experiences at various locations within the State.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Given its institutional and program accreditation, the credentials of its faculty, and the scope of its current operations in Louisiana, the senior staff recommends that the Board of Regents approve the license renewal for Alliant International University, located in San Diego, California.

## The Chicago School of Professional Psychology Los Angeles, California

## BACKGROUND

The Chicago School of Professional Psychology (Chicago School) is not incorporated in the State of Louisiana. The institution is a not-for-profit institution with more than 4,000 students at campuses in Chicago, the Los Angeles area, and Washington D.C. and is seeking license renewal. With the expansion of the school's programs to the East and West coast, the institution is currently accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

## ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The Chicago School makes available to Louisiana residents its Doctor of Psychology in Clinical Psychology program through an agreement with Xavier University in New Orleans. The program is accredited through the American Psychological Association (APA). Although some of the program is delivered online, much of it is delivered in traditional classroom format at Xavier University. The Chicago School is also making available its online M.A. in Clinical Mental Health Counseling and M.S., Ph.D. and Graduate Certificate in Applied Behavior Analysis, all of which include practicum requirements.

## **FACULTY**

The Chicago School employs four faculty to support the 26 students in its program at Xavier University in New Orleans, all fulltime and trained at the doctorate level. The additional programs are new and have enrolled no students.

## **FACILITIES**

The Chicago School leases approximately 2,300 square feet of office and instructional space from Xavier University. It also contracts with Xavier for the use of its library and students enrolled in the program have full access to the Xavier campus.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Given the credentials of its faculty, the institution's and program's accreditation, the general oversight by the home campus, and the institution's affiliation with Xavier University, the senior staff recommends that the Board of Regents approve license renewal for The Chicago School of Professional Psychology, located in Los Angeles, California.

## Lamar Institute of Technology Beaumont, Texas

## BACKGROUND

Lamar Institute of Technology (Lamar Tech) is not incorporated in the state of Louisiana. The institution is a publically-supported two-year college and part of the Texas State University System. Lamar Tech is located in Beaumont, Texas and is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

## ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Lamar Tech makes available to Louisiana residents online certificate and associate degree programs in Diagnostic Medical Sonography, Diagnostic cardiac Sonography, Health Information Technology and Respiratory Care. Typically, the online nature of the delivery system would not require licensure. However, the programs require clinical experiences/internships, licensure is necessary.

## FACULTY

Lamar Tech employs seventeen faculty in support of its online programs. Of the seventeen faculty, eleven are employed full time and four are trained at the graduate level

## **FACILITIES**

Since Lamar Tech operates programs online with administrative and academic support in Beaumont, it has no physical facilities in Louisiana. Students will complete clinical/internship experiences at various locations in Louisiana.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Given the credentials of its faculty, the institution's and academic programs' accreditation, and the general oversight by the home campus, the senior staff recommends that the Board of Regents approve license renewal for Lamar Institute of Technology, located in Beaumont, Texas.

## **Executive Summary**

The State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) is a national initiative which seeks to establish comparable national standards for the interstate offering of postsecondary distance-education courses and programs. SARA membership makes it easier for students to take online courses offered by institutions based in another state by reducing the cost and administrative burden on institutions seeking authorization in various states. SARA is a voluntary agreement among regional compacts (SREB, NEBHE, MHEC, and WICHE) and member states. Each member state approves their in-state institutions and renews their membership annually. Approved SARA member institutions may offer distance education programs in other SARA member states without additional authorization.

Act 13 of the 2014 Regular Session of the Louisiana Legislature authorized the Louisiana Board of Regents to seek SARA membership on behalf of the State of Louisiana. In October 2014, Louisiana's application for SARA membership was approved by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) and the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA), effective December 1, 2014. Since then, 23 Louisiana institutions have joined SARA.

Five institutions (Louisiana State University A&M, LSU Health Sciences Center at Shreveport, McNeese State University, Northwestern State University and The University of Holy Cross) have submitted SARA renewal applications. Regents' staff have reviewed the renewal applications and determined that they meet all requirements for continuing their membership in SARA.

Senior staff recommends that the Planning, Research & Performance Committee approve the Renewal Applications for Institutional Participation in SARA for Louisiana State University A&M, LSU Health Sciences Center at Shreveport, McNeese State University, Northwestern State University and The University of Holy Cross, and authorize staff to submit the approved applications to NC-SARA for final approval of SARA membership.

The Louisiana Board of Regents' Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission met on Tuesday, January 9, 2018, at 10:04 a.m., in the Board Conference Room on the sixth floor of the Claiborne Building, Baton Rouge. Chair Jones called the meeting to order and the roll was called.

The first item of business was the election of officers for the Commission for 2018. Chair Jones reminded the Commission that state law requires the Commission to elect from its membership a chair and vice-chair annually, and the law does not restrict the number of terms an individual can serve.

Commission member Lalonde nominated Mr. Jones as Chair. There being no other nominations,

On motion of Ms. Hay, seconded by Ms. Amrhein, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously elected Mr. Jones as Chair for 2018.

Commission member Hay nominated Mr. Fontenot as Vice-Chair. There being no other nominations,

On motion of Ms. Despino, seconded by Mr. Lalonde, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously elected Mr. Fontenot as Vice-Chair for 2018.

The next item of business was approval of the minutes from its meeting of November 28, 2017.

On motion of Ms. Hay, seconded by Mr. Fontenot, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously adopted the minutes of the November 28, 2017 Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission meeting.

The next agenda item considered by the Commission was two initial license applications, the first from Carter's Career Center, LLC, located in Monroe, Louisiana, and represented by the school's owner, Ms. Shanedra M. Carter. Ms. Marabella reviewed the materials for the Commission members, informing them that the institution would be offering one program of study, Medical Assisting, which is a 76.0 clock hour program with an anticipated

completion time of eight weeks. Carter's Career Center, LLC, had met all the legal and administrative requirements to be approved for an initial license.

Following further discussion regarding the offering of weekend classes, competition within market area and with Title IV schools, the availability of tuition payment plans for students, anticipated student population, maximum class size, and average job placement rate for Phlebotomists,

On motion of Ms. Amrhein, seconded by Ms. Hay, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously recommends that the Board of Regents approve an initial operating license for Carter's Career Center, LLC, located in Monroe, Louisiana.

The second initial license application considered by the Commission was from Louisiana Dental Institute, LLC, located in Monroe, Louisiana, and represented by the school's instructor, Ms. Joanna Peters. Ms. Marabella reviewed the materials for the Commission, informing it that this institution would be offering one program of study, Dental Assisting, which is a 96.0 clock hour program offered on Saturdays for 12 weeks. Louisiana Dental Institute, LLC, had met all the legal and administrative requirements to be approved for an initial license.

Following further discussion regarding the representative's Dental Hygienist professional background, the need for Dental Assistant training programs in the Monroe area, owner's motivation for opening school, classes offered on Saturdays, maximum class size, average turn-over rate for Dental Assistants, and the representative's belief that the Dental Assistant field is not saturated in the anticipated market area,

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, seconded by Ms. Despino, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously recommends that the Board of Regents approve an initial operating license for Louisiana Dental Institute, LLC, located in Monroe, Louisiana.

The next agenda item considered by the Commission was operating license renewals.

Ms. Marabella informed the Commission members that there were seventeen (17) schools seeking renewal. These schools scheduled for renewal were in complete compliance, having met all the legal and administrative requirements to be re-licensed.

Following further discussion,

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, seconded by Ms. Amrhein, the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission unanimously recommends that the Board of Regents renew the licenses of the following proprietary schools (initial license date in parentheses).

Ms. Marabella shared with the Commission that staff collaboration with Regents' IT staff has resulted in the commencement of the digitalization of the student records from closed proprietary schools. This in-house project, projected to last a year, utilizes a part-time employee. Staff extends its appreciation to the IT staff for their valuable assistance with this project.

The next meeting of the Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission is scheduled for Tuesday, March 13, 2018, at 10:00 a.m., in Room 1-190 of the Claiborne Building. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 10:53 a.m.

## THE LOUISIANA BOARD OF REGENTS UNIFORM POLICY ON THE PREVENTION OF UNPLANNED PREGNANCIES PURSUANT TO ACT 321 OF 2017

## I. POLICY STATEMENT

Act 321 of the 2017 Regular Session of the Louisiana Legislature (Act 321) requires that, effective Fall 2018, "each public postsecondary management board, in conjunction with the Commissioner of Higher Education and the president of each public university and community college system . . . shall adopt a policy requiring each institution under its supervision and management to address the prevention of unplanned pregnancies among unmarried students as part of an institution's freshman orientation activities."

Act 321 further requires that "as part of freshman orientation, each institution shall, as deemed appropriate, provide information to students that is recognized as medically accurate by the American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists regarding the prevention of unplanned pregnancy, including without limitation, abstinence education."

Act 321 prohibits, in all instances, the dissemination of any information regarding abortion methods, techniques, or providers, nor shall any student be directed to information or services provided by Planned Parenthood or any abortion provider.

## II. INTRODUCTION

To aid in the state's efforts to establish a uniform policy on the prevention of unplanned pregnancies by disseminating information to freshmen enrolled in postsecondary

institutions and in accordance with ACT 321, the Louisiana Board of Regents hereby adopts this Uniform Policy on the Prevention of Unplanned Pregnancies applicable to all Louisiana public postsecondary education institutions. This Policy gives public postsecondary institutions some options to explore opportunities and provide information for the prevention of unplanned pregnancies as part of their freshman orientation activities.

Since peaking in 1991, teen pregnancy nationally has declined by more than half. However, unplanned pregnancy among unmarried young adults in their 20's has remained high. As colleges strive to improve student retention and graduation rates, unplanned pregnancy and the responsibility of parenting has important implications for colleges.

Nationally, federal and state engagement in the dissemination of information to prevent unplanned pregnancies could assist colleges and universities by providing a platform from which to inform students. Some states have already taken action to address unplanned pregnancies at community colleges and public institutions. In 2014, Mississippi adopted a law requiring all public colleges and universities to develop unplanned pregnancy-prevention action plans. Arkansas passed a similar law in 2015.

## III. MANDATORY STATE REQUIREMENTS

All Louisiana Postsecondary education institutions shall address the prevention of unplanned pregnancies among unmarried students as part of the institution's freshman orientation activities.

Optional activities such as those listed below are encouraged in order to supplement the information disseminated during freshman orientation activities.

1. Identify opportunities to raise awareness of and provide information for the prevention of unplanned pregnancies.

- Identify opportunities for postsecondary students to serve as mentors or role models of successful behaviors and healthy choices for high school students
- **3.** Identify public and private grants available to address the prevention of unplanned pregnancy and to promote student success.
- 4. Collaborate with community healthcare providers and federally qualified health centers to promote access to care
- **5.** Identify challenges faced by students who are single parents (i.e., childcare, transportation); and
- **6.** Identify other topics or issues related to the prevention and reduction of unplanned pregnancies.

## IV. OPTIONAL OPPORTUNTIES FOR POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTIONS

Postsecondary institutions are encouraged to provide information about unplanned pregnancy in the following manner:

- Incorporate information about unplanned pregnancy into student support services (first-year experience, and other college courses)
- Integrate information about unplanned pregnancy into academic courses as appropriate.
- Provide resources that show the connection between unplanned pregnancy and college completion through college website and student activities; and
- Connect students to health services

## Agenda Item V.

By law, the Board of Regents' Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission is composed of nine members, each serving four-year terms without compensation. The Advisory Commission meets every other month and makes recommendations to the Board regarding new license applications and renewals of proprietary schools. One of the nine members is appointed by the Board of Regents.

Mr. Richard D'Aquin, a former member of the Board of Regents, has been the Regents;' appointment to the Advisory Commission. Primarily due to health issues and other obligations, recently Mr. D'Aquin has been unable to attend the Advisory Commission meetings and will be unable moving forward.

In recommending a replacement, staff has taken into account the advantages of appointing an individual who is local (thus more likely to attend the meetings) and knowledgeable about postsecondary education. The staff contacted Mary Lou Potter, a retired staff member of the Board of Regents regarding her willingness to serve if appointed. Mrs. Potter is extremely knowledgeable about postsecondary education (having worked in Academic Affairs at the Regents) and resides in Baton Rouge. She responded that she is willing to serve the State of Louisiana in this volunteer capacity if the Board approves her appointment.

The senior staff recommends that the Planning, Research and Performance Committee approve the appointment of Mrs. Mary Lou Potter as the Board of Regents' appointment to the Board of Regents' Proprietary Schools Advisory Commission.

Chapter 1. Governance and Structure

- •BoRSF programs offer both endowment matching and competitive opportunities for faculty in research, tech transfer, etc. In April 2017, the Board approved 127 new projects for funding with \$6.3M in first-year money available through the Support Fund. Approximately \$5M will be awarded for new projects in FY 2017-18.
- More than 3,000 faculty endowments (Chairs and Professorships) have been matched. New policies require regular expenditure of funds, and that campuses notify faculty recipients of how available dollars can be used to boost their professional work.
- •The Commissioner and Deputy for Sponsored Programs toured the State in August 2017, ensuring campuses, faculty, and foundations understand the uses of faculty endowments.

Over \$20 million in earnings from faculty endowments were expended in FY 2016-17 to support faculty professional activities. Such discretionary dollars bolster faculty research, provide opportunities to pursue economic development activities, and add resources for instruction.

RECOMMENDATION 3.2	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents recommends that the Louisiana Legislature fund a plan to bring faculty salaries to the Southern Regional Average.	Board of Regents

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

**02/2018:** The Board estimates that it would take in excess of \$77M to bring full time faculty salaries to the Southern Regional Average. Attachments 3.2.1 and 3.2.2.

The SREB average salary for full time instructional faculty at public four-year colleges and universities as reported in the 2017 SREB Fact Book on Higher Education was \$79,300. Louisiana's average was the lowest of the SREB states at \$67,400.

The SREB average salary for full time instructional faculty at public two-year colleges and universities as reported in the 2017 SREB Fact Book on Higher Education was \$52,600. Louisiana's average was second to last of the SREB states at \$42,500.

RECOMMENDATION 3.3	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will, beginning in FY 2017-18, align the constitutionally dedicated Support Fund and its competitive programs with the goals and priorities of the State, Board of Regents, systems, and campuses. Eligibility for funding will be limited to those academic areas reflecting existing and/or potential excellence and strongly associated with research, educational, and workforce emphases. - Redesigned programs were implemented 7/17 with release of RFPs; proposals have been submitted and will be reviewed by external consultants in spring 2018. Attachment 3.3.1.
- Revised programs attracted significant numbers of proposals from campuses across Louisiana; recommendations for funding, developed by out-of-state experts, will be considered by the Board in April 2018.
- •Scoring rubrics in all programs emphasize alignment with campus priorities and scale of impact of project activities.
- The workforce focus has been promoted to prominence in almost all BoRSF programs and subprograms, with the exception of research awards, which retain the focus with a lesser emphasis.
- •Support Fund staff have held numerous on-campus meetings as well as webinars and teleconferences with eligible applicants and administrators to explain and promote the redesigned programs and convey the significance of the sharp focus on the strategic priorities of campuses, systems, and the State.

RECOMMENDATION 3.4	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will continue to promote and facilitate research resource sharing among campuses and systems to ensure faculty and students have access to cutting-edge equipment and facilities, as well as assistance with intellectual property development and commercialization. ## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

- Planning is complete for a searchable online database, managed by the Board of Regents, which will provide information about research resources and expertise available on post-secondary campuses in Louisiana, facilitating partnerships and helping connect services with potential users. Programming and implementation will begin in Spring 2018.
- •The Board's Advisory Committee for the Advancement of Research in Louisiana connects academic and technology transfer leaders at public and independent universities across Louisiana, encouraging them to exchange best practices and offer assistance related to research partnerships and commercialization activities.
- •Federal grants managed by the Board of Regents, currently totaling nearly \$30 million in federal support and matched with \$8.6 million from the BoRSF, bring together faculty statewide in major areas of research and development. The active \$20 million NSF Track 1 award established the Consortium for Innovation in Manufacturing and Materials (CIMM), a partnership among five Louisiana campuses. Track 1 funding also allows the BoR to extend competitive funding opportunities to all campuses, such as Supervised Undergraduate Research Experiences and research travel awards for faculty and students.

RECOMMENDATION 3.5	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will incentivize campuses to pursue research and development activities that contribute directly to economic development in Louisiana, in partnership with Louisiana	Board of Regents

- BoRSF currently providing approximately \$2M per year to federal awards related to LA's STEM priorities (advanced manufacturing and materials, health networks, etc.).
- All BoRSF funding opportunities require that proposals demonstrate the link between project activities and Louisiana's economic development.
- •As a result of the Support Fund's reorganization in 2016-17, more points are awarded in competitive programs' scoring rubrics for economic contributions of projects.
- Despite severe fiscal constraints, BoRSF has added funding to Industrial Ties (research partnerships with industry) and Proof-of-Concept/Prototyping programs, as well as supported federal National Network for Manufacturing Innovation proposals.
- •LA Economic Development (LED) has representatives on all BoR Sponsored Programs Committees related to research and workforce. LED reads and critiques Industrial Ties Research Subprogram proposals, which establish partnerships between university researchers and private business and industry.

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

Two hundred and five Academic programs were included in the 2016-17 review approved by the Board of Regents (Attachment 3.6.1), resulting in the following actions:
- Continuation of 152 programs, with enrollment/completer updates at staff request;
- Termination of 49 programs;
- Revision of 14 programs, with the cancellations inherent in some of the revisions;
- Creation of 2 new programs in the Curriculum Inventory, as a result of restructuring.
- The Board of Regents will re-evaluate the thresholds in Fall 2018 in concert with its next scheduled statewide/low-completer review.

The Go Grant appropriation remained at approximately 50% of needed funding to support students currently eligible for the award, leaving many with a reduced or no award. Therefore, it is impractical at this time to develop an alternative grant program for students ineligible for the current program.

RECOMMENDATION 5.3	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents recommends that the Louisiana Legislature appropriate funds for a need-based grant program that requires a campus match.	Louisiana Legislature

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

• The Go Grant appropriation remained at approximately 50% of needed funding to support students currently eligible for the award, leaving many with a reduced or no award. Therefore, it is impractical at this time to develop an alternative grant program requiring a campus match.

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

To date the Louisiana Legislature has not established a process and an opportunity for business and industry to underwrite, through the purchase of naming rights, the State's scholarship and grant programs (TOPS, Go Grant, etc.).

RECOMMENDATION 5.7	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
5.7 The Board of Regents urges institutions to develop/enhance a "one-stop" approach that combines student services across the institution (e.g., financial aid, registrar, student accounts, basic advising, etc.) to minimize student confusion and wasted time.	Board of Regents

A number of the campuses have consolidated many of their administrative functions in a centralized location for student access and convenience. Whether they are a prospective or enrolled student, the purpose is to have a centralized location where they can take care of their administrative campus business in one place thus minimizing confusion and wasted time.

National models have been moving in this direction for several years, and Louisiana's institutions have taken notice. The consolidation and development of "one-stop shops" in Louisiana's institutions have taken place at the system level for some and at the campus level for others.

RECOMMENDATION 5.8	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents recommends that, in cooperation with the management boards, Louisiana's public postsecondary institutions develop/strengthen plans for the designation and implementation of meta-majors to help undecided students make informed course choices and maximize their likelihood for timely completion. In addition, all public postsecondary institutions should provide degree maps, identifying course paths to graduation and guaranteeing access to critical courses. ## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

- •Feb 2017: In conjunction with Complete College America (CCA), the Board of Regents staff held a statewide forum for faculty and staff to introduce game-changing strategies (meta-majors, Think 30, guided pathways, etc.) that promote college completion. In the spring, in coordination with LA postsecondary institutions, BoR launched a Think 30 campaign.
- Fall 2017: Over 50 members of the higher education community attended the Complete College America Convening held in New Orleans, LA. A post-convening session was held specifically for Louisiana higher education members.
- •The Board of Regents Louisiana Transfer Degree (<a href="https://latransferdegree.org/what-is-tdg/">https://latransferdegree.org/what-is-tdg/</a>) was designed to help students transfer easily from a 2-year to a 4-year institution and provides prescribed pathways for students to follow. These prescribed pathways fit nicely with the CCA's concept of the meta-major, as they cluster academic areas into large groupings such as humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences. Upon completion, the LA Transfer Degree is accepted at all Louisiana post-secondary institutions.
- Most post-secondary institutions in Louisiana have implemented degree maps, or audits to help students identify course paths and requirements to minimize confusion and keep students on track to graduation.

RECOMMENDATION 5.9	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will work with the management boards and postsecondary institutions to study the feasibility of developing alternative pathways – competency-based education programs and the upper level undergraduate certificate – for students who have military or other work experience: findings of the study should lead to proposals for such programs. To date, although the staff has had numerous discussions, it has not brought forth to the Board of Regents the feasibility of developing alternative pathways – competency-based education programs and the upper level undergraduate certificate – for students who have military or other work experience.

RECOMMENDATION 6.1	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will work with management boards and campuses and in concert with business and industry partners, to develop a plan that guides the creation and expansion of programs that connect students with work-based (employer-based) learning opportunities, including internships, co-ops, and apprenticeships. The plan will address, at a minimum: business partnerships, student eligibility, structure, access, delivery, costs, funding, documentation, and ways to determine the amount of employer engagement time needed to acquire the skills to succeed in real-world work environments. The BoR in conjunction with partner agencies led by the Governor's Office & LED applied for a NGA grant to expand work based learning in LA. The interagency team met regularly and were advised that they would hear status of grant by November 2017. In December 2017, the BoR and partner agencies were informed that Louisiana was not awarded the grant. However, as of January 2018, plans are still moving forward to advance work-based opportunities. Additionally, the LaSTEM Advisory Council's Workforce Subcommittee has included the creation of a work-based network as an upcoming priority beginning in 2018.

RECOMMENDATION 6.2	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will work with LCTCS to develop a plan that guides the expansion of opportunities for adults who have basic skills deficiencies or lack a high school diploma or equivalent. ## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

- Louisiana Community and Technical College System's adult education provider, WorkReady U (WRU), operates nearly 200 instructional sites across the state in Local School Systems, Community & Technical Colleges, State Corrections facilities, Community-based, and Faith-based Organizations. Scholarships, grants and other assistance are available for adult learners.
- LCTCS has made available scholarship funds for students to be able to pay for the HiSET, the High School Equivalency Test, needed for earning a high school equivalency in Louisiana. In addition, LCTCS, in collaboration with BOR and other agencies, has developed three additional methods for Louisiana adults to earn their high school equivalency to include college readiness coursework, career pathway coursework, and additional testing options. Also, BoR and LCTCS have collaborated on revising Regents' Academic Affairs policies to include the new College and Career Readiness credential which will give students credit for certain prior learning.
- LCTCS is currently revising its prior learning assessment policy to include not charging for transcribing already articulated credentials into course credits. The articulation tables include military training, industry based credentials, and CLEP test scores.
- Although LCTCS has undergone recent changes in leadership of WRU, staffs from Regents and the System continue to work together to advance the program.

RECOMMENDATION 6.3	PRIMARY
	RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will, in collaboration with workforce agency partners, initiate and support the creation of a CIP - SOC Crosswalk and a comprehensive workforce gap analysis based on the CIP - SOC Crosswalk to determine appropriate education to workforce alignment and increase degree and certificate production in high-demand fields. The CIP-SOC Crosswalk team has been established, comprised of representatives from BoR, the management boards, the Workforce Commission, and LED. The group meets monthly to address opportunities and barriers to finalizing a CIP-SOC crosswalk and conduct the comprehensive workforce gap analysis. Regents has contracted with LSU to lead the research and development process to establish these elements

•In early summer 2017, BoR requested SOC related data from the Louisiana Workforce Commission yet, following months of negotiations, BoR was informed in January 2018 by LWC that it would not be including an SOC code in the Louisiana Wage Record file, which is necessary to complete the Louisiana specific CIP-SOC crosswalk. Efforts will be made by regional and work force partner agencies and the CIP-SOC work-group to strongly urge the LWC to reconsider this action and explore ways to fund and support this work even if legislation is necessary. As an interim measure, Regents through its contract with LSU has developed crosswalks for workforce alignments and increased degree and certificate production in high demand fields.

RECOMMENDATION 6.4	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will work with agency partners and representatives of business and industry to create a clear and measurable value proposition for industry partners through the enhancement of workforce pipelines and related drivers of economic growth. The partners will engage with management boards and campuses, K-12 education, service providers for adult learners, workforce development boards, regional and local economic development entities, and other stakeholders to build regionally based strategies to identify critical workforce gaps, create asset maps, and implement plans to fill the gaps. ## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

•The BoR works regularly with work force agency partners to enhance the work force pipeline and narrow critical work force gaps. However, the absence of a Louisiana specific CIP-SOC Crosswalk hampers the state's ability to assess and address gaps in critical workforce and economic growth areas.

RECOMMENDATION 6.5	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents strongly encourages public postsecondary institutions to partner and engage with business and industry to provide a technically trained and highly competent workforce. The Board of Regents encourages the Legislature to allocate additional resources to a dedicated fund to meet the highest priority workforce needs of the State. The Board of Regents will develop a mechanism outside of its outcomes-based funding formula specifically for business and industry to contribute to this workforce-centered fund, leveraging their investment in postsecondary education to strengthen and grow the State's economy. HB 184 of the 2017 Regular Legislative Session by Rep. Abraham established the Louisiana Jobs Now Fund (Attachment 6.5.1) and tasked the Board of Regents with providing an annual report of the fund to the legislature. However, this bill did not make it through the legislative process.

The Board of Regents encourages the Legislature to allocate additional resources to a dedicated fund to meet the highest priority workforce needs of the State. The Board of Regents will utilize the mechanism within its outcomesbased funding formula to specifically target any business and industry contribution to this workforce-centered fund, leveraging their investment in postsecondary education to strengthen and grow the State's economy.

RECOMMENDATION 6.6	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents recommends that the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) and the Louisiana Department of Education (LDE) prioritize career coaching and counseling that successfully communicates to high school students (and their families) the connection between postsecondary education and current and future jobs. The Board of Regents will support legislation to provide funding to implement a comprehensive career coaching strategy for Louisiana.	Board of Regents, BESE and LDE

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

Preliminary planning of outreach efforts ongoing. BoR Staff serve as part of the JumpStart committees and on NSF Grant team, that is addressing this work jointly. Additionally, higher education partners participated at the annual Jump Start convention at the Baton Rouge River Center and continues to align college and career readiness initiatives with JumpStart.

RECOMMENDATION 6.7	PRIMARY RESPONSIBLE PARTY
The Board of Regents will work with partner entities, like Louisiana Calling, to successfully communicate to adult learners the correlation between secondary/postsecondary educational attainment and wage earnings.	Board of Regents, BESE and LDE

## **ACTIONS TO DATE:**

LCTCS is spearheading system wide programming that will afford adult students the opportunity to visit the campuses to learn about all the options that are available to them. Additionally, LCTCS has established a partnership with Country Music Television and is hosting a series of awareness "concerts" around the state to promote this information.
